# THOUGHTS FROM THE TREASURER

The Federation financial year ended on  $31^{st}$  September and Alan Todd, our Finance Manager, has been preparing the accounts in readiness for them to be examined. The bad news is that the accounts show an overall deficit of just under £100,000. The better news is that nearly £60,000 of that represents the loss on the value of our investments for the year, this was not unexpected considering the current financial climate.



Yes, that does mean we have had an operating deficit of £40,000. The budget for last year did show an anticipated operating loss of this level so thankfully we haven't done any worse than expected. Unfortunately for the last few years our expenses have been greater than our income, there are various reasons for this. Membership has dropped over the years and of course the pandemic has had a big effect as all fund raising and other activities had to stop whilst our fixed costs remained the same. We are cutting costs wherever we can, but we do have fixed term contracts which we cannot break.

I am sharing this news with you as we as Trustees feel it is important that you are kept abreast of the situation.

I would like to thank you for the messages of support for the changes we are implementing.

As the nights start to draw in and the dark days of winter approach we can either look at the current situation as being all doom and gloom or try to find the positives. Our Scandinavian friends embrace the shorter days and cold nights by wrapping themselves in warm blankets and lighting candles which add that magical sparkle.

Would you like to be a delegate at the NFWI Annual Meeting in Cardiff on 25<sup>th</sup> May 2023?



We will travel by coach on Wednesday 24<sup>th</sup> May from local pick-up points and return on Friday 26<sup>th</sup> May 2023. The delegate has to attend the whole meeting, vote on behalf of the WIs she is representing and report back (either in person or by email) after the meeting. As last year we are also offering a **virtual option**. Delegates who opt to attend virtually will be expected to attend the full meeting and will be provided with voting links for resolution voting during the meeting. **There will be no option to vote on agenda items after the meeting.** 

All delegates will be expected to attend the Resolutions Meeting on Wednesday 19<sup>th</sup> April 2023, the cost of which can be claimed back from the WIs she is representing. Delegates will be linked with 7 or 8 WIs and where possible she will represent her own WI.

Delegates have their shared accommodation paid for through the Federation per capita scheme and travel paid by the NFWI pooling of fares. NFWI have decided that unless there is a medical reason, delegates wishing to travel other than on the coach will do so at their own expense. Reasonable incidental expenses will be shared between WIs that the delegate represents. The only cost to a delegate is a single room supplement if required and if available and perhaps drinks in the evening.

#### LINKING THE CIRCLE An art project by Bev Williams of River WI

Bev Williams, a member of River WI has been studying for an art degree with the Open College of the Arts (OCA). She has been studying part time with OCA, and after 10 years has almost finished her degree. Studying for a degree in Textiles she has moved on to working with aluminium. 'Linking the Circle' marks an interesting journey into investigations using recycled aluminium. Creating new and innovative tools to process the unpredictable metal, Bev Williams uses her textile knowledge and expertise to join the thin pieces of aluminium, creating artworks to pay homage to her late father-in-law Bob Williams, through his WW2 RAF service and subsequent employment with the Aluminium Corporation Ltd in Dolgarrog, North Wales.

Building on from previous successful experiments with repurposed aluminium, a passion to work with this unpredictable metal was ignited. Using aluminium from drinks cans and manipulating the metal has produced some unexpected results mainly because of the unpredictability of the metal.

#### "I have to listen to what aluminium is saying to me, I can't anticipate or influence what to do with the metal, I have to be sympathetic to what the metal allows me to do."

During WW2, Lord Beaverbrook, the Minister for Aircraft Production, encouraged members of the public to donate aluminium pots and pans for the war effort, specifically to raise money to buy Spitfires. This was known as the 'Spitfire Fund'.

The artwork, draped over the fuselage of a Spitfire plane, contains almost 3,000 hand cut discs and is joined with thin wire. The artwork called 'Holding Pattern' is so named because of the link to aviation, where *holding pattern* is the circular flight path (often elliptical) maintained by an aircraft awaiting permission to land. 'Pattern' is also relevant because of the connection to patchwork.

### **NFWI RESOLUTIONS SHORTLIST 2022/23**



#### The four shortlisted Resolutions are:

*Save our water – every drop matters* - As global temperatures rise, there is a risk drought will become more frequent in the UK. This will place increasing strains on the UK's water supply and endanger our natural world. The NFWI calls on government and water companies to work together to develop robust plans that would ensure the UK's long-term water security, including addressing water leakage from pipes. The NFWI calls on WI members to take immediate personal actions to value and conserve water.

*Women to women – turning over a new leaf in the lives of women tea workers -*While in the UK we enjoy our daily cuppa, the mostly women tea workers who produce our tea struggle to access living wages, decent housing, sanitation or education for their children due to the low prices paid to producers for tea. The NFWI calls on UK tea companies and retailers to take action to fix the broken tea buying system to enable plantation owners to give women tea pluckers a fair deal so they can live the healthy and prosperous family life they deserve.

**Online gambling harm: time for action** - Online gambling has substantially increased, resulting in a growing number of people being exposed to the risks of gambling-related harms. Current legislation is inadequate in addressing the harms caused by problem gambling and in providing protections to those affected. This resolution calls on decisionmakers to introduce updated legislation and regulation to address these issues, and for increased support to be made available to those affected by problem gambling, particularly women and children.

*Clean rivers for people and wildlife -* Water quality in our rivers is shameful. Legally, designated bathing waters must be regularly monitored for pollution. The NFWI urges its members, the wider public, local authorities and Government to make, support and promote applications for official designated bathing sites on appropriate stretches of rivers in their area. This will be as instrumental to the clean up of rivers as it has been for water quality improvement at coastal beaches.

#### WHAT HAPPENS NEXT?

*2<sup>nd</sup> November 2022* – Shortlisted resolution resources, including videos and Power Point presentation will be published on the NFWI website and MyWI.

*21<sup>st</sup> November 2022* – Shortlisted resolutions, essential facts and points plus a selection slip appear in the November issue of WI Life.

14<sup>th</sup> February 2023 – Deadline for members' resolution selection slips or notification of voting results to arrive at the Federation Office. For this round of the process the Federation Office need to know how many members have voted for each shortlisted Resolution. This can be done by either sending the slips into the Federation Office or by email.

*Late February 2023* – A memo is sent to Federation confirming the outcome and the Resolution/s is also announced on the NFWI website and MyWI.

19<sup>th</sup> April 2023 – Federation Resolutions Discussion Meeting and Lunch

**25**<sup>th</sup> **May 2023** – Debate and vote on the resolution/s held at the Annual Meeting in Cardiff. For this final part of the process WIs will need to vote either for or against the Resolution but can given their Delegate discretion to change their vote after hearing from the expert speakers. If Delegates do exercise their right to discretion they will need to provide an explanation to the WI as to why they changed the WIs vote.
