# Bystanders can be lifesavers

A proposal for a new Women's Institute resolution that could lead to many lives being saved, has been put forward by Margate WI, and now we need your help!

We are calling on all WIs in east Kent to support our resolution, entitled 'Bystanders can be lifesavers'.

There are over 30,000 out-of-hospital cardiac arrests a year in the UK and less than one in 10 people survive. Women are 27 per cent less likely to survive than men. The chances are you will know someone who has had a cardiac arrest. It can happen to anyone, at any age, at any point in their life.

But there is hope. Early CPR treatment and use of a defibrillator can more than double the chances of survival.

We are calling on all WI members to work together to increase public confidence in providing this life saving action, through the training of CPR and promoting the importance of knowing what to do if you were to witness someone in the street having a cardiac arrest.

We want to work with local organisations to improve access to defibrillators in all communities.

We want to call on the Government to ensure all schools deliver the mandatory pupil CPR training, as well as providing training to use a defibrillator.

We want to give every person the best chance of surviving a cardiac arrest.

Using the might of the Women's Institute, we want to build on the good work already being done by other organisations including Resuscitation Council UK and the British Heart Foundation.

Our members have been searching to find the defibrillators available to use throughout our community, so we also challenge you to find out where your nearest one is and how readily available it may be. Visit <a href="www.defibfinder.uk">www.defibfinder.uk</a> to search for your area.

This month the resolution was submitted to NFWI for consideration. If successful it could make the shortlist of choices for WIs to vote on to become our campaign for 2025.

Situated just off the High Street, Deal this jewel of a museum tells the story of the development of films from cave painting to the present day. If that sounds only mildly interesting then think again, because the story unfolds through a series of fascinating displays that brings it all to life. The room that tells the tale of filming the horrors of the 1st World War brought tears to the eyes of us all, including the husbands that we permitted to come on this second outing. **Margate WI** shrinks down to join the model railway community

Members of Margate Women's Institute have been shrunk down to model railway size as part of Hornby's 70th anniversary celebrations in the town. The local group will feature in the new town layout alongside Dreamland, the clock tower, and of course the railway station, while trains travel along the track. On Saturday 17 August 2024, members attended the railway station to get 3D scanned.

While the group may seem larger than life, with a big campaigning voice and part of a huge national movement, for the townscape they will each be approximately 2-3cms tall. But when members heard that Hornby was appealing for people to appear in the crowd of the new layout, the group was excited to get involved, and pleased to be able to take part.

Margate WI President Hilary Askew said: "Next year our group celebrates its tenth anniversary and over the years, our members have really got involved in community events and campaigns in Margate. The WI has been in existence nationally for much longer, so we wanted to represent that in the layout.

"For our big Hornby adventure, members were scanned with items that help represent our group, including our flags and banners, the litter-picking equipment, and of course one of the handmade quilts which we regularly sew and donate to the Special Care Baby Unit at the QEQM hospital.

"We are grateful to Modelu, who got behind our ideas for the models and scanned us all in, and we are super excited to see mini-Margate WI be part of the crowd on Hornby's new town layout. Happy birthday Hornby!" Do you like quizzing? Have you ever wondered what it would be like to win the big one? Well, **GARLINGE WI** found out at their recent meeting. Sue Brooks likes quizzing and fulfilled her ambition beating the Chasers, but first she had to get there and she described her experiences dating back from Hughie Green's Double Your Money through to Fifteen to One and so on. Standing in front of the Beat the Chasers cameras, stricken by nerves, she couldn't remember 'Broadstairs' and had to tell Bradley Walsh she lived near Margate. Considered a no hoper by the team she walked off with £50,000! And she won our quiz taking home the top table's Bizzy Lizzies!

In August **Woodchurch WI** members went to Godinton House for a tour of the house and gardens followed by a cream tea.

The Godinton Estate consists of gardens and parkland in Great Chart on the outskirts of Ashford. Originally built as a Tudor hall house it now boasts many 17<sup>th</sup> century features and a 20<sup>th</sup> century garden designed by Bloomfield. Overtime the various owners have added additional wings and changed the façade.

In the 1400s the first owners were the Toke family. Captain Nicholas Toke, one of the many Toke descendants, had the longest continuous residency. By 1896 the house was owned by the Ashley Dodds who began the most extensive structural alterations. Mrs. Bruce Ward purchased the house in 1917 and her grandson Alan Wyndham Green inherited the property in 1951. Before he died (leaving no heirs) he was able to set up the Godinton Preservation Trust securing the house and its porcelain collection of Sevres and Royal Worcester, plus the gardens and parkland for the public's benefit.

Two excellent and well informed guides showed members the splendidly carved wooden paneling, portraits of the various owners and many of the downstairs reception rooms. Upstairs (in his bedroom) we traced Alan Wyndham Green's life story through his uniforms and the many different hats he



had worn throughout his life, all strategically placed over his bed canopy. In the final room of our tour we saw a photo of Margaret Thatcher when she visited Godinton.

Following this very interesting tour, where we had learned so

much, we retired to the tea room for a delicious afternoon cream tea or cheese scones. This was a most enjoyable summer event.

Members and guests at **Woodchurch WI**'s July meeting recalled the forensic events of the 2004 Tsunami. David Tadd, leader of the British forensic delegation told of his Team's efforts to identify the many thousands of people killed in the disaster.

On Boxing Day, twenty years ago a huge undersea earthquake near Thailand set off a vast human disaster The Thai that was to impact upon many nations. government sought international help with the disaster. Following a COBRA meeting in London David was invited to put together a British team to help recover and identify the dead. Within the following week the team was vaccinated, had formed a shopping list of vital equipment and gathered together photographers, scientists and forensic experts. They left Heathrow within a matter of days carrying all these essentials plus satellite phones and water. The Australian Federal Police were the first to arrive on the scene, but was soon followed by further international teams. The water surge had been so great that victims were even found several miles inland. The British team chaired the process of identification and it was agreed by the coroners that the post mortems should declare every victim had died from drowning.

Identification of the 5,600 victims was a huge and complicated task. Using, where possible, dental or medical records, cross matching finger prints, DNA and physical features it was possible over the next 15 months to finally identify the many thousands of bodies. It was essential to get the process completely correct. The final British missing person list of British subjects (about 125 people) was sent to the police college at Hendon where Family Liaison Officers were linked to the British families involved in the disaster.

Repatriation of the British bodies came through Heathrow airport where the West London coroner had the paperwork double checked before allowing for funeral director collection. This was a huge disaster for Thailand but a massive example of international support and cooperation.



The gardening group of **Deal Goodwins WI** recently visited Norton Court, Teynham. The gardens open under the National Garden Scheme for two days each year. There are beautiful gardens with wild flower meadows, a walled garden, plenty of topiary, a nut orchard and some colourful herbaceous borders. The group

found a large treehouse, accessible to the brave and two of our ladies ventured up to enjoy the view from the top! The gardens won't be open again this year but we would recommend a visit next year. PS for the entry fee of £10, you can have a cup of tea and a generous slice of homemade cake.

# ENVIRONMENT & NATURAL HISTORY GROUP

Join us at Wildwood, the Wealden Forest Park on Thursday 19th September, for a guided tour covering breeding and rewilding, then time to explore to see many endangered animals.
