

#### **Resolution Meeting**

Miranda Steeples was the speaker at the Federation Resolutions Meeting on Thursday 25th of April at Godmersham village hall.

Miranda spoke about the problems facing NHS Dentistry, but also made the point that by addressing the training of more dental nurses, hygienists and therapists not just dentists was the way forward.

She also made the point that as individuals we need to take responsibility for our own dental health by ensuring we brush our teeth at least twice a day, eat a healthy diet and don't smoke, and that this message should be passed on to our families, especially children.

#### FORMERLY MEMBERSHIP & ADVISORY

Following the Treasurer's Training sessions, we hope to answer some of the queries raised at the meetings.

Bank Accounts - which ones to use. We cannot advise which bank or building society is the best to use.

Where to put last year's balance on the spreadsheet. Use the receipts tab, row 7, column R. Input the B1.1 from last year's financial statement.

Paying a Charity, not the Speaker – see the answer below from the WI Handbook.

WI Handbook 2023, 9.3.1

Paying charity speakers or speakers donating their fee to charity. There are two potential scenarios here:

- 1. The speaker raises an invoice for payment by the WI. Here, the WI pays the invoice to the speaker for their services. The speaker may well then pass this on to the charity, but this is not a donation from the WI to the charity but a payment to the speaker for services.
- 2. The charity raises an invoice for payment by the WI. Here, the WI pays the invoice to the charity for their services. This is not a donation to the charity but payment for services, therefore the charity's charitable objects do not have to be in line with the WI's charitable objects.

Can we use outside caterers – Yes, for a modest lunch or supper (e.g. fish & chips or ploughman's) can be provided at an occasional meeting (e.g. Annual, Resolutions, etc.) provided it is incidental to the meeting (i.e. the refreshments are not advertised in the programme, and it is a regular monthly meeting). If Gift Aid is claimed everyone attending should be treated equally – no charge for visitors.

Gift Aid guidelines are available on MyWI if you are unable to access it please request a pdf copy.

The Presidents, Secretaries and Programme Secretaries Guides have now been circulated by email. If you are a new Officer, please contact the previous President or Secretary for a copy.

The location of the MCS User Guide has now been emailed to the Presidents, Secretaries and Treasurers.

Please, the Federation Office must be notified immediately of any changes to dates, times, and venues of Monthly Meetings.

Should you have any queries, please do not hesitate to contact the Federation Office.

- Subs and other receipts should not be recorded and put into petty cash.
- When emailing or phoning Advisers, or the office please state clearly which WI the query is about
- Treasurers should use latest spreadsheets or accounts books as amendments have been made to these.

#### **WI Climate Ambassador**

I signed up as a WI Climate Ambassador at the end of last year having attended the excellent climate change conference in London in October. As far as I know I am the only Ambassador in East Kent. If there are any others I would love to hear from you, or if anyone else is interested in signing up.

The role has two aspects: encouraging members to take steps to reduce their own carbon footprint and lobbying politicians and other influential people do more to address the climate crisis.

There are some good resources on MyWI and the national Public Affairs team organise regular online meetings.

At the April meeting there was an excellent speaker Bob Ward from the Grantham Institute. He talked about how close we are getting to it all being too late and what the Government urgently needs to do. If you would like to listen to him and the other speakers the recording is available on the WI channel on YouTube.

Last week I attended another Public Affairs webinar - this time on the Cleaner Rivers campaign. There were some very inspiring speakers from various other organisations. Industrial farming is at least as big a problem as sewage. Perhaps not so relevant for us as sewage in the sea but some of the campaigning tips will still apply.

I am due to attend another WI webinar next week - Larger Us - which I think is about how to engage people in the climate debate. And on a similar theme one by Climate Outreach but that's not a WI one.

My Branch (Hythe Bay) recently knitted this climate change scarf to focus our minds on just how much and how quickly the world has heated up since 1919. The pattern is available on the Climate Ambassador page of MyWI if your branch would like to knit one as well.



As a first step to reducing your impact on the environment, it's a good idea to work out your carbon footprint. There are a lot of calculators available online eg this one WWF Footprint Calculator .This will show you how you can make the biggest impact by making just small changes to your lifestyle.

This month's tip from me: how about trying a Eco Laundry Egg instead of buying a big plastic bottle of washing liquid?

I have now made contact with the Climate Ambassadors in East Sussex who seem to be a very active bunch so I am looking forward to sharing their ideas with you in future newsletters.

#### **Coronation Gardens Project**

We would like to update you that the Coronation Gardens project is launching a school pack in Mid-April. This will be an online pack which schools can access with content from all the partners, so tips on how to create a garden, growing, attracting wildlife and so on.

The WI's contribution is providing project ideas for schools to help them have different ways to use the produce they grow.

Some schools may choose to grow a garden that will need looking after over the summer holidays. In the pack we are also inviting schools to contact the relevant federation to find out which are their nearest WIs, so they can contact them and find out if the WI has a gardening group which could look after their garden for them in the school holiday.

Any federations that do get a query from a school will be passing on which are the WIs closest to them. This means that some WIs may be contacted by a local primary school asking if they can support them with looking after their Coronation Garden over the summer.

#### Review of the literary lunch

This year's literary lunch at Godmersham and Crundale Village Hall was both interesting and inspiring. Organised by the Performing Arts Leisure Sport Committee the two speakers provided much food for thought before a tasty lunch of soups and puds.

Carol Creasy from Herne Bay, a very young 80 year old, explained how she became an author 35 years ago inspired by her severely autistic son Philip, who really loves life. Her first book My Life Is Worth Living was written in 1993. It started life as notes in an exercise book and Carol taught herself to type before the interested publisher was able to accept it.

After her children left home Carol tried her hand at fiction writing ten novels including detective stories and a dark romance, also penning her own story Candidly Carol.

Bernie Morgan from Ramsgate a mother of three, former cleaner and stand up comedian explained how she wrote a book about her great grandmother, Cecil's Chattergee. Cecilia (1876-1947) was a woman who defied convention. She was a lawyer in India, when women did not have careers, was married four times and had 13 children.

Bernie who hosts the podcast Amazing Women, Invisible Lives went on a creative writing course and travelled to India for research. She stressed the importance of writing down family histories and when stuck was advised: "Write every day, treat it like a job."

A raffle, sale of books and two quizzes about authors and novels completed a very enjoyable event.

#### **50 YEARS OF MEMORIES**

My neighbour Linda Dyson introduced me to Cherryhill WI in 1974, I was a mother of two small children and was very pleased to have an evening off once a month and meet new friends. I have continued my WI membership for the past 50 years whenever I have moved house; since then I have been a member of Bearsted, Bredgar, Borden and Milstead.

Cherryhill WI met in the Cherry suite of The Council offices in Sittingbourne; it was named after the first local telephone exchange. A wonderful group of women organised so many opportunities for me to dip into including a bursary weekend at Denman WI College.

Mrs Renee Pritchard opened her house, on London Road, to Cherryhill for lots of opportunities including family beetle drives, family summer lunches, croquet and costume making for Pantomimes and Carnivals.

With Cherryhill choir WI I performed in local concerts, care homes and competitions including The National Westminster Bank South East finals in the Fairfax Halls. I joined pewter picture making class and then an introduction to car mechanics.

My children joined me in our Drama group for Pantomimes as dancers and singers and my husband was part of the lighting crew.

When I moved to Bearsted, WI was a little different, they owned their own hall and I met a member through visiting their monthly Saturday market, she put my name forward for consideration!

I was made very welcome and quickly joined their drama group, we performed in Jack and the Beanstalk and The Match girl; at meetings we certainly did not speak over one another, we raised our hand and spoke through the President!

When I moved to Borden I was still working full time, my neighbour, Monica Gandon, introduced me to Bredgar evening Group, I became President of Bredgar WI very soon after joining as I discovered that they were in serious difficulty and about to close through lack of volunteers.. I enjoyed many years there and took part in lots of activities including a hilarious play written by a member describing a meeting held in the 1920s, she wrote it after reading minutes of that time.

A Flying lesson, organised by EKFWI, from Manston airport to celebrate a friends 90th birthday was great fun we circled the Isle of Thanet and saw seals basking in the sun, in the estuary, I still have the certificate.

I joined Borden WI in retirement and have enjoyed many years as a member and also serving on the committee and then four years as President. Whilst at Borden I have attended a singing weekend at Denman WI College, and organised lunches, boat trips, and visits to castles, gardens and a gin factory.

Attendance at National Annual meetings has enabled me to travel to London, Cardiff Leeds and Liverpool and this year I am looking forward to attending the meeting at The Royal Albert Hall. National speakers have always been excellent and I really enjoy meeting members from all over the country.

This year I am attending an EKWI Literary Lunch for the first time and the new WI Learning Hub is next on my 'to do' list.

After fifty years with WI I am very grateful to those who introduced me to this wonderful organisation and I will continue to take, where I can, the opportunities offered to learn new skills and knowledge and do my best to encourage other women to explore all that is on offer and more importantly have fun.

# Campaign to clean up Margate reaches 100 bag landmark in town play area

A total of 100 bags of rubbish have been cleared from a Margate play area as part of an ongoing campaign by Margate Women's Institute.

Seventeen bags of rubbish and other larger items were collected from Tivoli play area by the group during the afternoon of Sunday 14 April 2024.

It was Margate WI's fifth visit to the green space since August 2023, and in total enough rubbish to fill 100 bin liners, as well as several larger items have been cleared.

Members felt the issue was so serious that they have approached local councillors to see what measures, such as including extra bins, could be introduced into the area.

The WI members have been carrying out the voluntary litter picks as part of their ongoing campaign to help keep the town clean and tidy and encourage others to do the same.

At the end of March, the women took part in Keep Britain Tidy's Great British Spring Clean. As well as clearing 24 bags of rubbish in an organised litter picking session in the Barnes Car Park area in Westbrook, over the two-week campaign the members individually also carried out their own litter picking sessions in their local streets.

Initially pledging to fill 50 bags with rubbish for the campaign, their determination saw them fill 85 bags from areas all over Margate and beyond.

Mandy Jarvis from Margate WI said: 'Keep Britain Tidy started from a campaign by the Women's Institute in 1954. As it is now celebrating 70 years, and our own campaign was inspired by those same women, we just had to take part and help to keep Margate marvellous!

'We had lots of people stop and speak to us as we cleared the streets and parks, and we hope others feel inspired to take steps to \_\_\_\_\_ protect our



environment.'

On Saturday 20th April, we held a fun raising evening. 'The Great Mates' played fantastic music from the 60's and 70's and everyone danced the night away.

April saw Woodchurch WI taking a stroll down Memory Lane with the Golden Years of Television. John Logie Baird had discovered how to transmit a moving image in the 1920s but it was not until 1936 that television broadcasting was thoroughly underway. Many of today's repeated programmes were first broadcast over 50 years ago. Some of the then popular light entertainment, with its characters and humour now non PC, may no longer appear on our screens. However, we still find "Some Mothers do have them", and "Porridge" raising a laugh. The 69 scripts of "Are you being Served?" pushed the boundaries of innuendo and scripts were only accepted if they passed the strictures of BBC's legal department. Unsurprisingly the 60 episodes of "Dad's Army" (with its gentle, decent, essentially Britishness) were dubbed into 22 different languages and broadcast to 76 countries. Music ranged from light Classical to "Top of he Pops" There were many children's programmes, including Blue Peter and "Playschool" which ran twice daily for 34 years.

How many programmes and musical personalities of the 1970s -80s can you remember?

An amazing group of talented women met at the Craft Group of **Chestfield WI** to put the finishing touches to their latest project knitting 70 cardigans for premature babies.

The cardigans will be delivered to QEQM and William Harvey on the 2nd May.
