We will meet at 10:30 and start with a guided tour of the mining museum with an ex-miner which takes about one hour. Before we walk, you can get yourself a quick coffee in the excellent café at the venue. The walk is around a nice, easy trail exploring Betteshanger Park. It visits the pond and meanders through the woodland and open fields, taking in the lovely scenery and is just under 4 miles. For those who wish there are shorter routes that can be walked

PUBLIC AFFAIRS TEAM

If you watched the drama Dirty Business and were shocked. This Citizens Science poll, which has just been published by Surfers Against Sewage, is equally shocking.

For years, the world's biggest brands have told us they're tackling plastic pollution. They've made bold promises. Claimed they're "part of the solution."

🔍 Not one of these brands **met their 2025 plastic targets.**

🔍 Many quietly **abandoned or watered them down.**

🔍 Some even **increased their plastic use.**

🔍 All while pushing **responsibility onto you**— the consumer.

🗑️ Plastic was found in **85% of all outdoor cleans.**

🗑️ **60% of plastic was single-use.**

🗑️ Just **12 brands** are responsible for over **half (52%) of all branded pollution.**

Can you guess which brands these are?

For the fifth year running, the same names dominate - including Coca-Cola, McDonald's, Cadbury, Tesco, Red Bull, Walkers, and Haribo, to name a few.

Instead of real action, they've hidden behind "recyclable" labels and stalled the very laws designed to hold them accountable. This is greenwashing at scale. And it's happening while communities, ecosystems, and our wild waters pay the price.

SAS are asking people when you spot branded plastic in places where it shouldn't be,

- Take a photo,
- Post it online, tag the brand, and use



#ReturnToOffender and #SurfersAgainstSewage

FROM OUR CLIMATE AMBASSADOR

With spring approaching I thought it would be a good idea to talk about what you can do in your garden to encourage wildlife.

There is some really good advice on designing a wildlife garden on the [RSPB website](#). You don't have to do everything it suggests - every little thing helps. It is a good idea to provide some shelter (such as a log pile) for wildlife as well as a source of water, and to plant as many native plants as you can with the aim of having flowers, seeds, and fruit for as much of the year as possible.

There's more good advice on the [RHS website](#), including the suggestion that you make your own compost and don't worry too much about having a really tidy garden. And of course, it's best to avoid synthetic pesticides. Every year, I take part in No Mow May - not the whole garden but patches of the lawn. As the Plantlife website says, "A healthy lawn with some longer grass and wildflowers helps to tackle pollution, benefits wildlife, and can even lock away carbon below the ground. There are more than 20 million gardens in the UK, so even the smallest grassy patches can add up and deliver enormous gains for nature, people, and the climate."

I'd be really interested to know how you are adapting your gardens for nature - it would be good to share some more ideas.

This will be my last contribution as Climate Ambassador, if you are interested in taking over the position please feel free to ask me about it.

In March, **Woodchurch WI** celebrated its 99th birthday with an *eggcellent* demonstration by Jane Napper on “Chocolate”. Focusing on Easter eggs, Jane explained how to ‘temper’ chocolate, before pouring it into moulds or making chocolate bark. She showed how to fill moulds, creating shallow shells which, when set, could be filled with Biscoff caramelised biscuit spread. Coloured cocoa butter is very useful for adding further decoration to the outside shell. Jane recommended the type of solid chocolate to use, the equipment required, before letting us know useful tips she has discovered whilst being involved with chocolate. We then had the opportunity to try the delicious finished products. Following this superb demonstration, members went on to enjoy birthday cake, wine, and nibbles.



Members of **Woodchurch WI**, and their friends and families, have knitted 50+ “Fish and Chip” jumpers to send to Rwanda. In extremely poor countries or war zones, newly born or

orphaned babies often have no clothes and leave the hospital wrapped, like fish and chips, in newspaper. These jumpers are knitted in bright, dark colours as water for washing is often scarce.

This month **Kennington WI** have been busy with Fund Raising events, our Jumble Sale proved popular and was declared successful by all involved, we appreciated the many generous donations, from all our members and friends, it was hard work but enjoyable. Our committee are already busy planning our next Fund Raiser.
