## PUBLIC AFFAIRS COMMITTEE – UPDATE

Your Public Affairs Committee meets every other month and one strand of its work is to continue to raise awareness of recent NFWI Health Resolutions. This month we are revisiting the NFWI Resolution 2019 ‘Five Minutes that Matter’. You may recall Cervical Screening SAVES LIVES. The screening test only takes 5 MINUTES and is one of the best ways to protect yourself against cervical cancer. Do be aware - Cervical Screening is not a test for cancer. It’s designed to help PREVENT cancer by checking for abnormal changes caused by the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV) so that they can be monitored or treated early if necessary. Anyone with a cervix regardless of their sexual orientation is eligible for cervical screening. This is because the Human Papilloma Virus which causes almost all cases of cervical cancer can be passed on through any type of sexual contact. Cervical screening can be uncomfortable for some people but it shouldn’t be painful. If you do feel any pain during your test please do tell your doctor or nurse.

Remember that there are lots of ways to make cervical screening more comfortable. The NHS recommends asking the nurse to use a smaller speculum and bringing something to listen to or read for example. We can all help to challenge the myths around cervical screening by speaking to friends and family about the test and why it is so important. The NFWI worked closely on this campaign with the national charity Jo’s Cervical Cancer Trust and their helpline is 0808 802 8000. For information and support about any aspect of cervical cancer including HPV cervical screening (smear test) results and treatment for cell changes; Jo’s Cervical Cancer Trust offers a wide range of online and offline services including a free helpline. Their website is [www.jostrust.org.uk-support/helpline](http://www.jostrust.org.uk-support/helpline). We do hope this brief update will continue to prompt all our WI members to keep this important aspect of health prevention uppermost in their thoughts and actions.

*Until now I have believed that fairies were a figment of one's imagination ..... then I found out that they really do exist and live in the orchard at the bottom of my daughter's garden. Let me introduce myself, I am Hilary Jackman, of sound mind but worn out body; my daughter persuaded me to come and live with her family last year and the arrangement has worked well. Today I am following my usual routine; I'm sitting huddled up in my garden chair just a shapeless bundle of coats and blankets, Dan my grandson, will be out soon with my morning coffee and rich tea biscuit; but first I must say Good Morning to my tiny friends. There they are as usual swinging on the lower branches of the apple tree, their pretty, bright dresses contrasting with the glow of rosy white blossom and the dark wood. Primrose waves first, with her pale yellow dress and auburn hair she is like a flashing ray of sunshine. Exuberant Bluebell blows me a kiss, her dress reminding me of walks in the woods each Spring through carpets of blue. Finally little shy Daisy peeps out from behind a branch and smiles, she is so sweet in her white dress and corn-coloured hair; I smile and wave and suppress the thought that Daisy is my favourite.*

*I have tried over the past months to share the fairies with my family but they nod and roll their eyes and after I had all those tests done at the hospital, they put it down to the DIAGNOSIS. Early onset dementia they called it but I knew that was just part of getting old, the fairies had always been there. In the past I'd shared with friends the experience of going upstairs and forgetting what I'd gone for, searching for keys when they were in my pocket, looking for reading glasses only to find them perched on my head and the number of times I'd said "know the face but the name has gone".*

*Like everyone else until I began to sit quietly in the garden I believed that fairies were part of childhood, inhabiting stories and films but like Santa Claus we put these beliefs away as we grow up. Now I know they are very real, but not to everyone. If it's warm enough I set out*

*every morning except Sunday when my family take me to church. I never complain, I know how well looked after I am, I've seen care homes on the TV. UGH! Day after day I was happy sitting on the patio, then when I found out that fairies live near the bottom of the garden in what used to be a very productive orchard I was ecstatic.*

*The first time I saw them there must have been about twenty girls and boys dressed in an artist's palette of colours, holding hands and dancing, weaving in and out of each other creating a rainbow of patterns and colours. Then my daughter come to take me in for lunch and like a stroke from a magician's wand they were gone.*

*Oh, that sounds like the doorbell, that will be my friend Enid. The fairies like Enid, they'll probably put on a dancing display for us. If you believe in fairies you will be welcome, you pop round anytime and I'll introduce you.*

## MARGATE WI HELPS TO SPREAD CHEER IN COMMUNITY QUILT PROJECT

Members of Margate WI have taken part in a special parade to show their support for women everywhere and celebrate joy. On Saturday 11 March, club members joined other community groups in carrying specially-made patchwork quilts in a parade which headlined this year's Power of Women festival in Thanet and celebrated International Women's Month.

During the January club meeting, WI members worked with local designer (who was also the club's founding president!) Zoe Murphy to make blocks of patchwork, featuring individual ideas of what brings us joy.

Some of the members also joined a group of volunteers who worked for three months to help sew together the patchwork blocks into quilts, not just by the WI, but from all of the community groups who had worked with Zoe on the Cheer Quilt Project. Around 20 quilts were made and the final results were displayed and carried in the parade in Ellington Park, Ramsgate.

Some of the quilts will be donated to local good causes and others are expected to go on display locally in Thanet.
