

WI Climate Ambassador

A couple of weeks ago I attended some on line training about having climate conversations. It was organised by Public Affairs in conjunction with Larger Us. It was a brilliant event attended by WI members from all over the country. The emphasis was on listening to people and telling them stories rather than hectoring them. Being positive and hopeful rather than focusing on doom and gloom.

On a more local basis I attended a Making Space for Nature workshop arranged by Kent County Council. The aim is to create a priority list of habitats and species that need protection in Kent. Last week I attended a meeting in Sandgate (Folkestone) to discuss the ongoing problem of sewage in our seas. The organisers were very well informed and had done a lot of research. They are particularly campaigning for better information on our beaches about the cleanliness of our seas and also upgraded pumping stations - something that has been achieved in other parts of Kent.

The WI is a non-political organisation but we are encouraged to lobby our MPs and councillors on relevant issues. So if any prospective parliamentary candidates come knocking on your door please do ask them what they will do to protect our environment and what actions they will take to reduce carbon emissions if they are elected <u>on July 4th</u>.

TIPS FROM THE PA TEAM

We all know that turning the thermostat down a degree can save you money on your bills and help the planet with little impact on our lives, but what are some other changes we can make easily to save our world and our pocket?

One family in Broadstairs has some tips and tricks to share:

- Invest in solar charging devices rather than battery or USB charging. Solar power banks are available from as little as £20 and can be charged on the windowsill even when the weather is bad. From these you can charge any USB connected device – phones, lights. Headphones etc. On a sunny day, these charge quickly. It's just a matter of remembering to put them out and seagull proofing them!
- 2. Driving anywhere? Charge something. USB chargers for the car are commonplace you can even get splitters. However, experience tells us that anything more than a double makes it ineffective.
- 3. Sign up for your energy company's saving challenges and take part this might mean moving when you do the washing by a couple of hours but can save you pennies to pounds.
- 4. Read by solar lamp, or go for an evening/dawn walk rather than sitting in front of the telly good for mind, body, soul and wallet!
- 5. Most importantly, most of this doesn't cost much, but does take a flexible attitude and a few moments planning each day. Once you get used to it, it's just part of the routine.

All items will be donated to charities so please be aware that no items will be returned.


The prize for the winner will be a \pounds 25 voucher, this is from a donation made by the Etchinghill Craft and Home Economics Guild which unfortunately had to close.

ARCHIVING WI MINUTES AND CULTURAL MATERIAL

I have been helping the Federation office to archive our records with the Kent History and Library centre at Maidstone.

As a president of a local group I had archived my WIs records last year when we reached 100 years. I was conscious that the minutes of our meetings tell an important historical story and must be kept safe. It is so easy to lose minutes when officers change. Our minutes were in a loft, and it was pure luck that a relative recognised they were WI minutes.

The Federation office holds the minutes for all the suspended and closed WIs. They also have photos, scrapbooks, banners and lots of material.

Whilst some items can be destroyed after 7 years the committee and monthly minutes must be kept indefinitely.

There are lots of things that you can do to prevent loss of items and to make it easier to locate and store these items.

Initially all minutes were handwritten into minute books. Remarkably these preserve well, with years and years in one book they take up very little space. Minutes are now typed and printed out, often kept in plastic folders in files. These items take up a lot of space.

When you print off your minutes sticking them into a record book or binding them together is a better way of keeping the records. It keeps them together, in order and takes up less room.

One of the most important things to do is to write the date in full. We have so many minutes with just the day and month and it takes a long time to year date them. And of course they must be signed! It is vital for current committees to know where their records are and to have it recorded where they are being kept. Officers must inform their families about their WI records with instructions on where to send them.


Many WIs have lots of cultural materials, books, photos, scrapbooks, newspaper articles and much more. They can be kept in a memory box and displayed periodically at events but a new way of storing these items is in a virtual memory box. These can be kept and shared easily.

Another important ask is that you label photos with names, event and date- they are useless without this information.

Why not set up an archiving subcommittee and get all your material together. It can be fun looking through everything.

The history of the Women's Institute, the experience and lives of women and an accurate record of social history is all within our monthly minutes. Let's store them carefully.
