REPORT ON THE ANNUAL COUNCIL MEETING

After two years of Covid restrictions we were finally able to hold the 100th Annual Council Meeting at Folkestone on the 16th March 2022.



The adoption of standing orders, appointment of tellers, Chairman's address, presentation of Annual Review for 2020-2021 and adoption of Financial Statement for year ended 30th September 2021, together with appointment of examiner for 2021-2022 were carried out. We then moved on to hear from Sam Secomb of Pentins who advised us on the progress of the Federation's Investment Portfolio in what has been a very difficult time. We had an update on the Federation's Conversion to CIO which is progressing as quickly as is possible.

The Parkinsons Care and Support UK speakers were very informative and they told us how the University of Kent is trying new things to help sufferers have a better quality of life. Presentations were made for various achievements both for this year and previous years when it was not possible to do this.

We heard from speaker Helen Sharman who became the first British Astronaut in May 1991. She is a role model, a pioneer and an inspirational speaker and certainly someone to look up to.

Our Chairman Gill Crone thanked everyone and it was then time to say our goodbye's to Gill and to Dorothy who have tirelessly worked for the WI over what has been the most difficult of times. They were both presented with bouquet's and thank you cards and a few tears were shed! WOODCHURCH WI'S 95TH BIRTHDAY CELEBRATIONS

Woodchurch WI was formed in March 1927 and members celebrated the 95th birthday with cheese and biscuits, wine and cake skillfully sliced by President Lynn and Gwyneth Sutton our WI Advisor. Let's take a moment to reflect on life in 1927 and discover some of the things that were happening 95 years ago.



It was an exciting period as technology was developing rapidly. Like today, earthquakes and floods took their toll and the UK was in the grip of a devastating death toll from an influenza epidemic. King George V was on the throne and Stanley Baldwin was the Conservative Prime Minister.

In terms of fashion everything from hairline to hemline went short. Clara Bow, the embodiment of the modern flapper was the first "It" girl setting a new style in fashion.

In the cinema audiences witnessed the first ever synchronized sound and picture film "The Jazz Singer" in which Al Jolson immortalized the famous line – "You ain't heard nothing yet!" Actresses such as Mary Pickford, Greta Garbo and Myrna Loy were making names for themselves in the film industry.

Books which our members may have been reading were, "To the Lighthouse" by Virginia Woolf, and Winnie the Pooh and Christopher Robin were introduced by A. A. Milne's' "Now We are Six". Cars were becoming more available and the first Volvo rolled off the production lines in Sweden as the Model A Ford took over from the successful earlier Model T. Clarence Birdseye received a UK patent for frozen fish fingers. Transatlantic aviation pioneer and hero Charles Lindenberg travelled non-stop from Long Island, New York to Paris.

I wonder what events the next 95 years will bring us.

AUTUMN to be led by the Cookery Garden and Science sub committee - an exhibit entitled A Woodland Walk. Exhibits will be staged on open tabling and should use natural plant materials; appropriate accessories may be incorporated.

Overall dimensions - 18"x12"x12" (45cmx30cmx30cm)

WINTER to be led by The Public Affairs sub committee - a scrapbooking page showing evidence of support of a community day or work done on a resolution. Photographs, posters, letters to MPs or craft work.

The NFWI have released their Code of Conduct which all members are expected to follow.

The NFWI Code of Conduct

1. Introduction

The WI is an organisation centred on friendship, campaigning, education and fun. We are a place for all women where members are welcomed, supported and able to fully enjoy their membership and utilise all of the opportunities that comes with it.

To ensure the aims of the organisation are realised, members must abide by this Code of Conduct which sets out the behaviour expected of WI members.

2. WI members

WI members must:

- demonstrate the WI values of truth, tolerance, justice and fellowship
- be kind and considerate towards others
- use inclusive and polite language
- share views, comments and feedback respectfully and appropriately
- respect others at all times
- feel able to make mistakes and learn from these
- raise concerns and complaints
- comply with applicable WI, federation and NFWI policies
- ensure the WI is a place for all women by welcoming new members
- avoid bringing the organisation into disrepute

3. Trustees

WI and federation trustees must:

- act in the best interests of the WI as a whole including federations and the NFWI
- respect and maintain confidentiality
- support the decision of the majority
- work in partnership with each other
- act within the governing documents and the law
- manage conflicts of interest effectively
- ensure concerns and complaints are followed up appropriately
- carry out their role with the WI vision statements in mind: bold and inspiring, growing and relevant, flexible, and inclusive

4. Unacceptable behaviour

The NFWI has a zero tolerance policy of discrimination of any type, including racism, homophobia and transphobia, and of any behaviour that intends to cause distress to another. Any such behaviour must be reported and will be investigated.

NEWS FROM NFWI

Resolution Going Forward to NFWI Annual Meeting

This year there were 75,110 selections cast. The NFWI Board of Trustees has agreed to put forward the top resolution to the Annual Meeting in June. The wording of the resolution is as follows:

Women and Girls with ASD & ADHD - under-identified, under-diagnosed, misdiagnosed, under-supported

Women and girls presenting with autistic spectrum disorder (ASD) and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder (ADHD) are going undiagnosed. The NFWI calls on the government and funding bodies to fund research into the female presentation of ASD and ADHD, and for action to be taken to improve the diagnosis process for women and girls, to ensure that they are equipped to better manage these conditions and do not suffer in silence. The NFWI further calls on WI members to raise awareness within their WIs of the issues facing women and girls with ASD and ADHD.
